



One Drop, CIER, Indigenous-led organizations and private sector partners unite to celebrate the successful first phase of the Indigenous Water Allyship

The program aims at improving living and health conditions in Indigenous communities through water and art.

Montreal (Quebec) – November 29th, 2024. On November 27th, the One Drop Foundation and the Centre for Indigenous Environmental Resources (CIER) held a public event in Montreal to celebrate the meaningful work carried out by Indigenous-led organizations from across Canada as part of the Indigenous Youth, Art and Water Initiative (IYAWI). With a wide attendance of Indigenous and non-Indigenous leaders from Montreal, Puvirnituq (Quebec), Caldwell First Nation, Serpent River First Nation, Six Nations of the Grand River (Ontario), Winnipeg (Manitoba), Calgary (Alberta), Vancouver, Powell River and Tofino (British Columbia), the event helped raise awareness of the many ongoing water-related challenges in First Nations, Métis and Inuit communities while fostering collaborations with local organizations and private sector entities.



Despite living in one of the world's most water-rich countries, Indigenous communities in Canada continue to be disproportionately affected by issues related to safe water access. Led by CIER and One Drop, IYAWI empowered Indigenous youth to express their voice and vision around water-related challenges through art and community-based approaches. This initiative marks the initial phase of a long-term water access program, the Indigenous Water Allyship, running from 2023 to 2030.





As part of this first phase, the One Drop Foundation and CIER had the honour of supporting nine Indigenous-led and youth-focused organizations in 2024, each embracing distinctive cultural elements and art forms to deliver impactful messages. From Indigenous Elders and Youth Council's virtual reality project to Water Movement's mural artwork exhibited on Parliament Hill, these social art projects all emphasize the importance of water and tackled the pressing challenges surrounding it in many Indigenous communities in Canada.

"Our project achieved the first youth-led water walk in over 150 years, and we hope to see more water ceremonies worldwide, bringing healing to the waters."

Based on the learnings from this initiative, and with the vital support of Keurig Dr Pepper Canada, Ovivo and Power Corporation of Canada as founding Water Impact Partners, the One Drop Foundation will pursue its mission in Canada through the Indigenous Water Allyship. This long-term program aims to increase access to safe, reliable, and culturally appropriate water and sanitation services in Indigenous communities, including water governance, water conservation, climate resilience and gender-responsive practices.

The upcoming phase, aiming to improve living conditions for more than 20,000 community members, will begin in selected Alberta and Ontario First Nations in 2025. To achieve this, One Drop and its partners will directly collaborate with more than 7,000 community members to codesign water security and/or water resource management plans for execution, establishing a path for future additional communities to join the Indigenous Water Allyship program.
